It examines the Bhakti movement, emphasizing the teachings of Sant poets like Kabir, Mirabai, Tulsidas, and Namdev, and its challenge to caste and ritualism. The Sufi movement is studied through the contributions of Chishti, Suhrawardi, and Naqshbandi saints, highlighting their role in promoting spiritual syncretism. The course analyzes poetry, philosophy, music, and the sociopolitical impact of these movements. By studying Bhakti and Sufism, students will understand their enduring influence on Indian culture, literature, and religious thought.

8	Course Outcomes:  1) By the end of the course, students will be able to analyze the historical, political, and cultural circumstances that gave rise to the Bhakti and Sufi movements in medieval India.  2) Students will gain a deep understanding of the central tenets of the Bhakti movement,
