Historical geography is an interdisciplinary field that blends geographical and historical methods to study how geographical features influence human activity over time. The relevance and usefulness of this course lie in its ability to provide students with a deeper understanding of India's rich historical and geographical landscape, especially focusing on Maharashtra. By integrating the disciplines of history, geography, archaeology, and cultural studies, this course provides students with a comprehensive understanding of how natural features such as rivers, mountains, and climate have profoundly influenced India's historical trajectory. Focusing on both broad themes and regional case studies, with a special emphasis on Maharashtra, students will examine the interplay between geography and human development from ancient times through the medieval and modern periods. The curriculum is organized into two modules. The first module investigates ancient historical geography, revealing how early civilizations interacted with their environment through archaeological and literary sources to trace the footprints of prehistoric and ancient inhabitants. The second module delves into the medieval and modern eras, exploring the impact of trade routes, urbanization, and socio-economic transformations brought about by historical milestones such as the rise of port cities and the influence of colonial
