It focuses on how Sathe used the traditional Marathi ballad form to articulate powerful narratives of resistance, caste oppression, working-class struggles, nationalism, and international solidarity. His ballads not only speak to the dignity of laborers and Dalits but also connect Maharashtra's cultural heritage to global movements, as seen in pieces like Ballad of Barlin, Ballad of Stalingrad, and Nankin Nagarapudhe. Students will explore the aesthetics, politics, and performance aspects of these compositions, engaging critically with their historical contexts and enduring impact.
