Ordinances and regulations relating to the degree course in heritage management

O 5415 THE DEGREE WILL HENCEFORTH BE CALLED BACHELOR IN HERITAGE MANAGEMENT (BHM)

OBJECTIVES

- (a)To create for the students of University of Mumbai an additional avenue of self employment and to benefit the culture industry with trained specialists
- (b) This course is for students intending to become managers of natural and cultural heritage attractions;
- (c) To provide an understanding of cultural tourism and its dynamics. Increased visitor access to natural and historical heritage sites have consequent environmental impacts.

(d) It will impart understanding to suit the changing role and nature of public sector.

- (e) The recognition of the appropriate informational content, style and level of interpretative provision for any heritage resource is important for its marketing and consequent long-term viability. The course addresses such themes, tensions and practices.
- (f) It would also enable the students to seek careers as exhibition managers, curators in museums, art historians and to work with artisan groups creating effective market links for arts and crafts.

ELIGIBILITY

- O 5416 A candidate for being eligible for the admission to the Degree Course in BHM shall have passed XII STD Examination of the Maharashtra Board of higher secondary Education or its equivalent and secured not less than 45 per cent marks in the aggregate at first attempt. Commerce, Science and Arts candidates are free to apply. Applications of graduate students who wish to apply for this degree will also be considered on the same percentile considerations as above.
- O 5417 Every candidate admitted to the Degree course in the constituent /affiliated college recognized institution for teaching this course shall have to register himself /herself with the University
- O 5418 This is a full time course. Working students will not be eligible. The duration of the course will be six semesters spread over three academic years.
- O 5419 The candidate has to score 50 per cent in the centralized test to be held by the university.
- R 4741 The method of testing will be internal assessment 50 marks with 50 marks Examination
- R 4742 The course will consist of 36 modules of which 33 will be theory papers
- R 4743 A batch will consist of not more than sixty students

R 4745 For internship and orientation the teacher should guide the student in the course of five lectures. For the project the student should work with artisan groups or heritage restoration projects or at archaeological sites before he /she writes a report which should be judged on the basis of originality rather than a library endeavour.

R 4746 Scheme for examination

(i)It will be a reading and a practice orientated course.

(ii)The exam will be conducted at the end of each semester.

(iii) Total number of lectures per theory paper shall be a minimum of 50 and a maximum of 55 each of 50 minutes duration.

There will be four sessions per week in each module.

Part of this time can be utilized for seminars. The teaching should be both teacher led and student centred. The seminars can involve group work or pair work.

For projects the teacher will have to initially engage about 5 lectures for orientation. On this basis a student must prepare a bibliography before choosing a project. The project report should be 5,000 words and must include an abstract, a synopsis and a bibliography which has been referred to by the student.

The student shall visit field for data and analysis of the same. Before the report is finalized the students will have to present their findings to the faculty wherein the faculty shall provide guidelines for finalisation. Plagiarism or the unawknowledged copying of others work will lead to rejection of a project. It may not involve copying word to word. But it is understood as copying by reordering of words or omissions and additions. The project should also include a viva voce.

Monitoring of student performance will be done by an academic monitoring committee. This will meet twice a year immediately after collection and collation of coursework. If many colleges opt for it, this course will be able to have an independent Board of Studies.

Attendance at all teaching sessions is compulsary:

Attendance will be monitored at all teaching sessions

Action will be taken against those who have less than 75 per cent attendance in any one course. There will also be field trips to museums, galleries and sites. All these will be an essential component of coursework and will be compulsory.

The course syllabus will have to be revised and reading lists updated every two years. It will be desirable for the coordinators of the teaching courses to meet ever three months to discuss the practical aspects of teaching.

The BHM courses are to be assessed in the semester which they are taught. Three methods of assessment are used on the scheme, coursework, examination and project.

The subject of the Dissertation must be consistent with the named programme. It is undertaken with the supervision of an experienced tutor and after a taught Research Methods module. Participants following the full-time mode are expected to submit their Dissertation by 1 October following Semester 5.

Each theory paper will be of 100 marks. But it will be computed out of 50. The remaining 50 Marks will be allotted by a combination course work, seminar and project.

The following weightage is given.

Examination at the end of semester 50 marks but the paper will be out of 100 and of three hours duration.

Coursework and project 50 marks in the ratio of 30:20.

Coursework would include

- 1.field trips with report writing
- 2. Participation in a seminar
- 3. Participation in a workshop or model creation.

The responsibility of evaluation during the first four semesters will rest with the college or institution where the students have been admitted for the course. The college will carry out the internal evaluation forsemesters IV & V, theory papers in semesters V and VI will be sent to the University by the respective colleges before the commencement of the respective semester-end examination.

The evaluation of the project in the third year (5:6) will be carried on by the University inclusive of a viva-voce examination. The projects will be assessed of 60 of the total marks while the viva-voce will carry 40 marks.

R 4747 Passing Standards

- (i) A candidate will have to secure at least 40 per cent marks in each of the theory papers and projects to pass the examination
- (II) A candidate will be placed in first class if he or she secures a minimum of 60 per cent marks in each of the theory papers and projects in semesters V and VI considered separately.
- (III) A candidate will be placed in second class if he or she secures a minimum of 50 per cent marks in aggregate in each of the theory papers and projects in semesters V and VI considered separately.
- (IV) A candidate who fails in any particular theory paper shall be allowed to reappear for that theory paper/s OR projects. However his/her theory marks will be carried over. However he/she will not be entitled to any class.
- (V)A candidate who fails in more than two heads of passing at the semester end examination shall not be allowed to keep terms for the next semester.

OBJECTIVES: This placement for a period of four weeks or 28 days will allow the student to obtain a first hand experience of working in a cultural organization. The placement will be secured by the college at three levels: within the state, at national level and with international organization.
