# Ordinances, Regulations and Syllabus relating to the:

## DIPLOMA SOCIAL WORK

## Preamble

The Second Review Committee of UGC in Social Work (1980) recommended that the Social Work educational institutions in the country need to focus on training of professionals who can function at the grass root level and be in partnership with the other formally trained Social Work degree holders while addressing local social issues. Many of them are unable to pursue two year long formal training due to demands of their family, job and age factors. However, they are deeply committed and motivated to pursue social work career at sometimes in their lives. Hence this one year Diploma course aims at building social work knowledge content, skills and value system in individuals who want to take up social work either as their formal career or as their part time voluntary work with social organizations. It provides opportunity for citizens to reach out to others in society who is in need in the spirit of nation building, restoring the human dignity, and establish more a just world.

#### **Objectives**

#### Amended Objectives:

- Introduce the learners to the reality of poverty, under-development, illiteracy and other issues affecting the country.
- Develop skills in studying and analyzing problems at the micro level and formulating goals for change.
- Develop basic skills in mobilization of resources in the neighborhood to alleviate the problems of the affected groups
- Sensitize learners to the problems of vulnerable groups.
- Develop awareness of self and one's role in problem solving.
- Expose students to the role of government and non-governmental organizations and civil society groups in dealing with the problem situations.

#### Reasons for amendments:

- There is need to change the nomenclature of the course as there are several courses with the same title being run by Individuals and NGOs. It is necessary to differentiate the University programme from the other existing programmes.
- The evaluation of the existing course with the students, teachers and other experts for the past three years reveals the need to upgrade the syllabus content, so that the current job requirements in the field are met.
- The existing syllabus does not assign any marks field practicum. The students therefore tend to take it lightly. The introduction of marks for field practicum will make the students to take field work more seriously.
- The existing intake of students needs to be raised as there is more demand for the course.

#### 0.5505 Amended:

Title of the Course: DIPLOMA IN SOCIAL WORK

#### Eligibility

O. 5506 Amended.: Every candidate for the Diploma in Social Work must have the minimum qualification of XII<sup>th</sup> std. from the Maharashtra Board of Higher Secondary Education or from any other Board, recognized by the University of Mumbai.

#### Duration

R 5099 Amended. Duration of the course: One academic year. (18 hours per week)

## Intake capacity

R 5097 Amended. A maximum of 50 students will be admitted to the course.

#### Faculty

R 5101 Amended. The Course Teachers for all papers will be MSW with 1 year teaching/ work experience. Experts from the related fields of medical, psychiatry, sociology and law also will be drawn as visiting teachers.

#### **Examination Pattern**

#### R. 5086 Amended.

- a) There will be an internal assessment of 40 per cent of the maximum marks assigned to each paper and a University Examination for the remaining 60 per cent of the marks for each paper at the end of the course, except for Field Work Project.
- b) The internal assessment in each paper will be based on the:

Written assignment of 20 per cent
Term end test of 20 per cent
Total 40 per cent

- c) 75 per cent of attendance is required for each theory paper to be eligible for appearing at the University examination. Completion of the allotted field work hours is also mandatory to be eligible to appear for the theory papers.
- d) The final examination shall be held by the University of Mumbai at the end of the course on the prescribed syllabus, with papers having 60 marks
- e) The University Examination carrying 60 percent of the total marks assigned to each theory paper will cover the entire syllabus prescribed for the respective theory papers. Each paper will be of 3 hours duration with 8 questions (4 questions from each section) out of which the candidates will answer 5 questions, one being compulsory from each section. The other 3 questions can be selected from any of the two sections.

# Introduce new resolution for Field Work Project Assessment

R.  $\int \frac{1}{2} \frac{6}{8}$ : The student will put in 100 hours of field work in any one social institution/ organisation recognized by the college. A project report will be prepared by the student at the end of the field work to be submitted for the assessment and for the viva voce examination conducted internally by the course teacher along with one external expert.

#### STANDARD FOR PASSING

R. 5093 Amended. The candidate will be declared passed when he or she obtains minimum marks of 40 per cent out of 100 marks allotted to each paper including field work project.

The candidates who have failed in any papers may claim exemption in the other papers where they have obtained minimum marks of 40percent out of the total marks allotted to that paper.

The candidates who have failed in the first attempt and passed in the second or subsequent attempts will be declared to have passed in 'P' grade.

The candidates who have passed in the theory papers but have not passed in field work project will have to repeat the entire field work project hours and appear for the viva voce examination.

Students must complete the diploma course within a period of 3 years from the time of registration for the course failing which the student will have to re-register.

# Evaluation: The Grade Point
