Revised syllabus for the Post-Graduate Course in Comparative Mythology Paper I and II

(with effect from the academic year 2007-2008)

Revised Syllabus for the Post-graduate Course in Comparative Mythology with effect from June, 2007

There will be two papers each of two and half hours duration carrying 80 marks and an internal assessment for each paper carrying 20 marks. There will be a dissertation of 50 marks concerning any topic of mythology (Total marks 250).

Paper I

Topics:

- A) Types of story and its relation to myth; creation of myth; myth-making stage and myth-using stage; development of mythological studies from ancient to modern times—Yaska, Max Muller, Tylor, Andrew Lang, Frazer, Malinowski, Freud, Jung, Strauss, D. D. Kosambi, Peter Munz, Joseph Campbell, Mircea Eliade, Wendy Doniger O'Flaherty and Sadashiv A. Dange.
- B) General Idea of Vedic, Epic and Puranic Mythology --Categories of myths from this mythology---
 - 1) Myths of Creation
 - 2) Myths and rituals connected with Fire, Rain, Fertility and Holy Drink, and their inter-relationship
 - 3) Myths of Supernatural Birth
 - 4) Myths relating to mountains, rivers, holy places and festivals---40 marks

There will be an internal assessment for this paper at the end of the First term --- 20 marks
