Dr. Ambedkar Centre for Study of Social Justice

Main Mandate:

The main mandate of the proposed centre is to discuss, disseminate and to sensitise the people about social justice. Hence, as a first activity of this centre we proposed to start one year P. G. Diploma Course in Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Thoughts.

Introduction:

India has produced great thinkers and social reformers who, by their revolutionary and path breaking thoughts and actions, have left a lasting impact on not only India, but on the world as a whole.

Admittedly, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar was a great thinker and visionary who fought for 'empowerment' – social, educational, economical, political and cultural – of the oppressed. He stressed on the empowerment of the oppressed as a means of their release from exploitation and injustice which are social forms of violence against the people cited above.

He was a prolific writer. There was a remarkable combination of writings and waging protest on every possible front in him. He not only fought for the emancipation of the oppressed but strived for overall development of the nation.

His ideas and thoughts on social justice form a framework which needs to be seen in a proper way. His ideas need to be translated into practice keeping in view of the basic agenda i.e. social justice.

Objectives of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Thoughts:

The main objective, besides others, of this proposed centre is to disseminate and put his thoughts into practice through constructive research, meaningful teaching (teaching with concern) and extension activities aiming at awakening the conscience of the people at large.

- (a) To understand and disseminate the concepts relating to Dr. Ambedkar and the philosophy enunciated by him, related to social justice and equity, conflict resolution, non-violence and non-violent protest-movement, empowerment of women, rural development and related topics.
- (b) To conduct field work and action programmes on the basis of constructive programme enunciated by Dr. Ambedkar and action programmes related to the thoughts of Dr. Ambedkar
