Preamble:

“Can my work be copyrighted? Can I be credited for this piece of writing? Can I be credited for this design of lesson plan? Can I publish my thesis? What would be the tentative cost of the same? These are few of common inner voices of an academicians that often go unheard or remain mere inner voices especially in developing countries. The education and the publication ecosystem demonstrate a wide knowledge gap in terms of literary works in East and West world. The knowledge gap in these countries with respect to copyrights of literary works, academic writings and its licensing is way undermined despite being a talent powerhouse. It is one of the major fall-out of the education ecosystem that largely bifurcates the knowledge areas with pre-defined disciplines and norms. The degree of autonomy, relatedness and competence in the ecosystem is limited. However, with increased cross – country collaborations and need for open educational resources, imparting and developing a healthy licensing culture vital. Addressing this niche area, the course intends to serve the instrumentalist function of filling the knowledge gap. The course would be largely based on Bloom Taxonomy and involve Project Based Learning to sharpen creative side of the learner. Further considering the wide spectrum of the audience the content so developed will be based on the principles of Universal Design for Learning ensuring effectiveness of the course so developed.

Necessity of the Course

On interaction with students and educators, it was observed that Intellectual property rights from the point view of a student or an educator is being viewed with a limited angle i.e. patent of drugs, process or scientific inventions, indications etc. This is because the access to this content has been limited in the areas of law and business. Diving deeper into this arena a short survey was conducted that revealed lot of misconceptions and shorter vision on IPR and Creative Commons.

Further being an educator we all are involved in various research projects, articles, writing thesis, creating new pedagogical content etc but often fail to provide it's a wider platform along with recognition. Thus, literary writings to a very great extent even today rely upon publishing house for copyrights that in turn limits the accessibility as the works are then available on paid basis. Thus, developing a certificate course considering the Universal Design for Learning is expected to bridge the gap.

Guidelines for Trainers:

Please practice the “4 Cs” of 21st Century Skills in all parts of the course:

- **Collaboration** – Come to the course with an open mind and ready to learn from and with others.
 - **Communication** – Be respectful and professional at all times.

- **Critical Thinking** – Ask questions, listen well to other opinions, and look for solutions to problems.
- **Creativity** – Use your imagination, try new things, and have fun!

There should be continuous evaluation based on weekly assignments. The four types of weekly assignments include the following.

- **Input** – Input includes readings and videos. Each week you should assign students to read the required article and watch the required video, then take the quiz to make sure you understood key points from the required input. You may take each quiz as many times as you like (this is a model of testing-as-learning). Each week there are also Reading Options. These are not optional! Rather you should ask students to select just one of the suggested articles and read it.
- **Activities Portfolio** – Over this course, you will share case laws with each other and by end of the course you will have a good collection of case laws for reference.
- **Group Activities** – Each week you will converse or collaborate with a small group of course colleagues and try discussing on project work.
- **Beginning and Endings** – Participate in a discussion each week to begin thinking about the module theme. At the end of each module, share or “cascade” information from the course with other participants.

Though some feedback will be faster, trainers are generally expected to communicate assignment feedback to the learners no later than three days after the end of each course module.

Objective 1: Acquire knowledge about intellectual property and intellectual property rights.

- identify the key concepts and distinction between intellectual property and intellectual property rights.
- Familiarized with the leading International Instruments concerning Intellectual Property Rights.

- show familiarity with understanding and interpreting case laws □ apply the case laws in practically and plan for IPR

**7 POINTS JUSTIFICATION FOR
CERTIFICATE COURSE IN COPYRIGHTS AND PLAGIARISM**

1.	Necessity for starting the course:	<p>Academic Integrity has been poised with plagiarism. It lacks creativity and innovation. In the quest to obtain grades or promotions, contextual richness has faced severe blows. At the same time, educators and learners both have limited exposure with respect to copyright and open licensing. As part of teaching-learning, the stakeholders often use resources available on the internet but lack a systemic approach to its usage and presentation. This often deteriorates the quality of academic writings. UGC itself has published a book on ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND RESEARCH QUALITY, DECEMBER 2021 stressing the need for the same. Also, every year thousands of students as a part of their curriculum prepare a research-based project work, but the quality of this project work is extremely poor. To fill this gap and upgrade the quality of research as envisaged in National Education Policy, it is of paramount importance to make such courses available to students and move towards the multi cafeteria and multi-disciplinary approach in the education ecosystem.</p>
2.	Whether the UGC has recommended the course:	<p>UGC has given guidelines for introduction of professional course (https://www.ugc.ac.in/pdfnews/4968873_11m_one-year.pdf). Further Universities are allowed to run the diploma / certificate courses and with due approval of its governing councils/ statutory council wherever required (Ref: https://www.ugc.ac.in/faq.aspx). However, u/s 5(16) under Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016 (Mah. Act No. VI of 2017), Universities are empowered to start to prescribe the courses of instruction and studies in choice-based credit system for the various examinations leading to specific degrees, diplomas or certificates in a stand-alone format or joint format with other State or national or global universities.</p>

3.	Whether all the courses have commenced from the academic year 2019-2020 (2022-23):	The above certificate course recommended by the BoS in English, and further approved by the statutory bodies is to be introduced from the Academic Year 2023-24.
4.	The courses started by the University are self-financed, whether adequate number of eligible permanent faculties are available?:	The certificate course is purely self-financed. The department/affiliated colleges interested in its affiliation need to comply with the norms laid down as above.
5.	To give details regarding the duration of the Course and is it possible to compress the course?:	The duration of the course is maximum 6 month {6 Months (July-December / January-June)} with total 35 contact hours consist of maximum 2 Credits on completion of total 35 hours and project report.
6.	The intake capacity of each course and no. of admissions given in the current academic year:	The intake capacity is set to maximum 40 students per batch.
7.	Opportunities of Employability / Employment available after undertaking these courses:	The course is capable of streamlining learners to new vistas of employment opportunities such as authors, content writers, consultants, bloggers and open resource educationists.
